ATTENTION ALL 4-H MEMBERS & PARENTS — ADD/DROP INFORMATION

There are several responsibilities as a 4-H member and a 4-H parent. One of these responsibilities is the adding and dropping of 4-H projects. Due to the issues with 4HOnline, here are the details for adding and dropping projects.

Adding Projects: 4-H members CAN ADD 4-H projects in 4HOnline. Remember, you must be enrolled in the projects you plan to exhibit at the County Fair no later than May 1. Be sure to check and double check the projects your child(ren) are enrolled in.

Dropping Projects: At this time, 4-H members CAN NOT drop projects in 4HOnline. While this is currently being worked on, we are unaware of the timeline when this will be fixed. Once this option is available, we will let you know. For now, do not worry about dropping projects.

It is <u>YOUR</u> responsibility to add any projects by May 1, 11:59 p.m. You will need to do this by logging into 4HOnline. After May 1, the system will not allow you to add or drop projects.

Remember, 4-H members must be enrolled in the project area(s) they will be exhibiting in at the county fair. If you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact either Extension Office.


TWO NEW PROJECTS

MID-YEAR AWARD REVIEW PROCESS

Every year, 4-H members have the opportunity to complete a 4-H Member Achievement Plan otherwise known as the 4-H Pin Application. You should have received information about this award at the beginning of the 4-H year from your 4-H Club Leader. Be sure it is the Central Kansas District 4-H Pin Application found on our website (http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h) For those of you who are new to 4-H, this process considers the entire 4-H year and everything that the 4-H member has done throughout the year. It is not something that is specifically based on one project like the 4-H Project Award Applications or Record Books are. This provides an opportunity for a 4-H member to set goals for their overall involvement in 4-H and earn a pin in the process. You can find the 4-H Member Achievement Plan at http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h Awards & Recognition → Member Achievement Plan. Regardless of what pin the 4-H member is applying for, they will all fill out the same form, but the items required will vary (see the details on the first page of the application).

Now is the time to do a *status check* on where the 4-H member is with their pin application. The Trips & Awards Committee would like to offer the 4-H members the opportunity to do a mid-year appeal, if they can determine right now that they are not going to be able to get the pin in which they have set out to achieve. There are lots of 4-H events that will still occur this year, but there are several that have come and gone. A 4-H member may have missed an opportunity or two. What does this all mean and what should I do? Here are some steps for the process:

- 1. Fill out the 4-H Pin Application as completely as you can to make it current.
- 2. Determine if you are on the right track. Are there still things that you need to complete? Check the 4-H Newsletter and Master 4-H Calendar (both available at http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h) to see what other things are still yet to come this 4-H year.
- 3. If you have missed an opportunity and you do not see where it can be picked up later this 4-H year, please complete the CKD 4-H Deferral Appeal Process Form. This form can be found at http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h → Awards & Recognition → Appeal Process. Follow the directions on this form and submit it with a copy of your 4-H Pin Application to either Extension Office no later than 5 p.m., May 3.
- 4. The Trips & Awards Committee will review your forms and get back to you with a response. This will allow you to know if you continue working towards your goal of achieving the pin, if you will be able to receive it in November. Keep in mind, the Trips & Awards Committee may ask you to do certain things in place of what you may have missed. All of this will be outlined in their response back to you.
- 5. Additionally, there is a document with helpful hints for parents on the website located at http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h → Awards & Recognition → Helpful Hints for Parents.

4-H CAMP

The Oz-Some 4-H Camp Group is so excited that we will have camp at Rock Spring 4-H Ranch this summer *June 24-27*! Camp is an amazing opportunity for our 4-H Youth and we appreciate all Rock Springs is doing to make sure we get to camp this summer. Details for campers and counselors are below.

There will be COVID-19 Protocols to protect all the campers, counselors, and staff at Rock Springs. The first protocol is the number of campers and counselors we can bring will be limited from the past. That way we can make sure everyone has plenty of space to practice social distancing. Additionally, masks must be worn unless youth are swimming, eating or sleeping. Families are advised to send at least 2 masks per day for each child.

CAMP COUNSELORS

If you are currently 4-H age, 14-18, ...we need YOU! <u>Camp Counselors</u> are 14-18 years of age (preference given to older youth). The counselor application will be online only and is available at https://kstate.qualtrics.com/jfe/form/SV_8xd3SWntoON5XAW. Applications will be due **April 15**. All counselor applicants *must* attend the Counselor Training on June 23 and 24 at Rock Springs. All interviews will be held via Zoom and will be recorded. Dates for the interviews are April 15, 21, and 22. Interviews will be scheduled between 3:00 -5:30 p.m. If these dates and times don't work for you, contact Sarah (semanss@k-state.edu) to set up an appointment for an interview. Counselor Scholarship Information: <u>Camp Counselors will need to complete the 4-H Council Scholarship Application and meet the necessary requirements to be eligible for the 4-H Council Scholarship. The scholarship application is due to either Extension Office by April 15. Remember, the application requires an Organizational Leader signature and the 4-H member signature. If the scholarship application is approved, the counselors will not have to pay their registration fee. Please make sure you have attended a Volunteer Screening Orientation in the last 5 years.</u>

As of 4/1/2021, scholarship applications will <u>only</u> be accepted in the office or via U.S. mail.

<u>Campers</u>

Because of these protocols we are opening registration for camp at 6 a.m. on April 15, for <u>4-H members who</u> <u>are enrolled and activated</u>. Age for 4-H camp this year is 9-12, 4-H age (before January 1, 2021). Because of the limited numbers, non 4-H members will not be able to attend and there will be no rookie camp. It will be first come first serve. You will use the link below to fill in your camper's information; you will either get directed to Camp Doc where you will pay and register your camper or you will get your information put on a waiting list. The camper's spot will not be secured until payment is received. All the counties that camp with us will have access to registration at the same time. Registration will be open between these dates/times: Thursday, April 15, 6 a.m. through Friday, April 30, 11:59 p.m. To register, go to https://tinyurl.com/20214HCamp. Be sure to register early as we anticipate spots will fill up fast!

Remember...all campers will ride the bus to and from.

Cost of Camp for Campers: Cost for regular campers is \$250 or \$120 with the 4-H Council Scholarship.

Camper Scholarship Information: 4-H Members who register for 4-H Camp will need to complete the 4-H Council Scholarship Application and meet the necessary requirements to be eligible for the 4-H Council Scholarship. The scholarship application will include a paragraph on "Why I want to attend camp." Scholarship sponsors include: 4-H Council, Ottawa County 4-H Foundation, Salina Downtown Lions, Saline County 4-H Development Fund, and Tractor Supply Company Paper Clover Campaign. The completed scholarship application will be due to either Extension Office by April 30, 5 p.m. (remember, it requires an Organizational Leader signature and the 4-H member signature). You will receive a scholarship code to put in to get credit for the scholarship before paying for camp. Please read the text carefully in CampDoc for this code as you register for camp.

As of 4/1/2021, scholarship applications will <u>only</u> be accepted in the office or via U.S. mail.

OTHER CHANGES FOR 2021 CAMP:

- There will be a refund policy because of illness in place all the way up to camp and prorated refunds during camp
- No youth that is ill should come to camp
- If a youth becomes ill while at camp they must be picked up in 6 hours
- Masks must be worn unless youth are swimming, eating or sleeping
- Families will have to send their youth with masks and we recommend 2 per day

If you have any questions please don't hesitate to contact Sarah. Our theme this year is, "Let's Glow Crazy" and we are excited to Glow Crazy with our Oz-Some campers!

Remember...all campers will ride the bus to and from camp.

If your child(ren) have meds, they will need to be checked in with the Ambassadors at the time of loading the bus. It will then be given to the nurses when the buses get to camp.

QUALIFIED FOR A RED WHEEL SCHOLARSHIP?

If a 4-H member qualified for a red wheel scholarship, he/she can use this for 4-H Camp! The 4-H member will need to register online. Once he/she has registered, he/she will need to contact Karen (kborch@ksu.edu or 309-5850) at the Salina Extension Office to let her know that he/she has registered for camp. Once the registration has been confirmed, a check will be sent to the 4-H member/family. Please allow 7-10 business days for this to occur.

<u> Attention Livestock Exhibitors – 2021 YQCA certification</u>

Certification dates are set for April 1, K-State Polytechnic, College Center and April 13 Minneapolis Courthouse Meeting Room and will begin at 6:30 p.m. Masks and social distancing are required. Please see the March 4-H Newsletter for details.

CHECK-IN FOR: MARKET MEAT GOAT & MARKET LAMB

The Districtwide tagging & check-in will be held April 28, in Salina (fairgrounds) and April 29, in Minneapolis (fairgrounds) from 4 to 6 p.m. for meat goats and lambs. Tags will cost \$3/tag. If interested in exhibiting livestock at the State Fair or Junior Livestock Show, a nomination will be required. The cost is \$8/animal. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, masks are required and social distancing will be enforced during the check-in.



ATTENTION: SWINE EXHIBITORS



4-H members will check-in their own swine projects through a required process via email. Information on this process will be sent out to ONLY the families who have children enrolled in the swine project. If you are not already enrolled in the swine project and plan to show swine, be sure to get enrolled in 4HOnline.

LIVESTOCK DECLARATION FORM

The Livestock Declaration Form is required for all market animals for county fair, state fair, and the Kansas Junior Livestock Show. For the Kansas State Fair and Kansas Junior Livestock Show, the due date for Market Beef – May 1; due date for Swine, Commercial Heifer, Sheep and Meat Goats – June 15. There will be two forms which will be found under 4-H Member Forms & Documents at http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-H. One form will be labeled as DISTRICT for the county fairs, and the other form will be labeled as STATE for KSF and KJLS.

KANSAS STATE FAIR & JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW INFORMATION

- All Kansas State Fair and/or Kansas Junior Livestock Show exhibitors are required to complete the YQCA program to be eligible for either state show.
- DNA Hair Samples are required for each nominated animal for ALL SPECIES. Envelopes for the DNA Hair Samples will be \$0.50/each.
- There is a one-time/year \$20.00 fee if a nomination has to be returned to the family for any reason (i.e., incomplete form).
- <u>Wether Dam Ewes and Commercial Ewes</u> Nominations and declaration form sealed DNA hair sample envelope and official 4-H ear tag number are due June 15 for KSF and KJLS.
- <u>Commercial Breeding Heifers</u> Nominations and declaration form sealed DNA hair sample envelope and ear tag and legible tattoo are due June 15 for KSF and KJLS.
- <u>Steers and Market Heifers</u> Nominations and declaration form sealed DNA hair sample envelope are due by May 1 for KSF and KJLS.
- <u>Market Lambs</u> Nominations and declaration form sealed DNA hair sample envelope and scrapie tag number along with ear tag number are due by June 15 for KSF and KJLS.
- <u>Market Hogs and Commercial Gilts</u> Nominations and declaration form sealed DNA hair sample envelopes are due by June 15 for KSF and KJLS. All animals must be ear notched and it must be drawn on the form.
- <u>Meat Goats</u> Nominations, declaration form, sealed DNA hair sample envelope, scrapie tag number, and ear tag by June 15 for the KSF and KJLS.

Nomination forms and DNA hair sample envelopes can be picked up at either Extension Office. A nomination will be required and makes the animal eligible for both the KSF and KJLS. The cost to nominate an animal will be \$8/animal. **Remember, a nomination is not an entry for the show.**

JAPANESE EXCHANGE PROGRAM — HOST FAMILIES NEEDED

Looking for some new fun and excitement this summer after a long year of staying home? Host a new friend from Japan in your home this summer, July 23 – August 18. Kansas 4-H International Exchange Programs are offering hosting opportunities for 22 families this summer. Host families are needed who would be willing to host a Japanese boy or girl. The Japanese youth will be between the ages of 13 and 15. Our responsibility is to make host family assignments matching each delegate with an American same-gender host sibling as soon as possible so that families and exchange delegates can communicate and get to know each other.



Any Kansas family with children aged 10-16, who is interested in the Japanese culture, may host. A separate bed is required, but not necessarily a separate room from the host sibling. Delegates are 100 percent medically covered with 4-H insurance and bring their own spending money. They can go on host family vacations, camping trips, or join their host sibling for summer camps and the county fair. The focus is everyday family life. A link to the Horse ID Form can be found at http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h under 4-H Member Forms and Documents, "Horse ID." Be sure and check the back page, lower right-hand corner for the **January**, **2020** date to ensure you have the correct form.

Items to note:

- The form MUST BE front and back of one page, not 2 pages.
- A standard size picture MUST BE attached. The picture should include all 4 legs and feet showing a profile of the horse with the head turned toward the camera. ALL markings must be clearly visible.
- Members, Parent/Guardian, Owners (if horse is leased) and County Agents MUST sign and date.
- The ORIGINAL 4-H Horse Identification Certificate MUST accompany the 4-H'er. The county office and project leader may have a photocopy.
- This form can be signed anytime between now and May 1, 2021.

Welcome Back Central Kansas District 4-H

We are all excited to hold our face-to-face meetings again. Here are a few reminders on how to keep us all safe!



Before the Meeting:

- Stay at home if you feel symptoms- Reach out to the leader for a virtual option for you to join if you feel safer participating from your home or if you are staying at home because you are experiencing symptoms.
- Please bring a face covering- Fortunately, we all already recognize each other from ZOOM; therefore, please be sure to wear a face covering during our meeting. If you are unable to wear a face covering, please join us virtually and we'll see you on ZOOM!
- Wear face covering properly- As tempting as it is to lower your face mask to talk, fight that temptation! Proper protection will cover your mouth AND your nose.
- Wash your hands- Knock out some of those germs prior to coming! Wash those hands with soap and water for a minimum of 20 seconds prior to leaving your home.

During the Meeting:



Avoid physical greetings- It is natural to want to shake each other's hands, high five, or give a touch on the shoulder, but **REMEMBER-** It's safer to give a little wave or even a nice, quick head nod.



Social distance- If we can read something our neighbor is holding, then we are TOO close! Please maintain a social distance of at least 6 feet from each other to reduce any risk of transmitting of COVID-19.



Practice good hygiene- Have an itch on your face? Twinkle your nose like in "Bewitched" (ask your parents!) Do your best to not touch your face! Need to cough or sneeze? Cough or sneeze into your elbow but remember not to "elbow bump" with that same elbow to greet someone.



Be wise: Sanitize- Washing hands with soap and water is the best way to get rid of germs, but in case you can't find a sink- we have you covered! We will have sanitizing bottles available for your convenience.



Speak loudly- Don't be afraid to let your voice be heard. Those in the room and on ZOOM need to hear you!



Fun and games- Recreation helps us get to know each other. Choose games that don't require shared equipment or contact!



Snack wisely- Pre-packaged is the way to go! Try to snack away from others.



Stay on task- Let's keep our agenda goals in mind so we can make needed decisions, learn, have fun together, and make it home safe.



After the Meeting:



Disinfect surfaces- Don't disappear too quickly! We will need to disinfect our chair and table area prior to leaving.



Avoid physical greetings- Give a little wave or head nod again on your way out.



Wash your hands- You have heard this often, but repetition is good for the mind! Make sure to wash your hands again when you get home.
