2023-2024 4-H ENROLLMENT DETAILS

Kansas 4-H will continue to use the online enrollment system this year; 4-H Members, Cloverbuds, Screened Volunteers, and Prospective Screened Volunteers are required to enroll online. The enrollment system is now open and is ready to take enrollments for CKD! Please note the helpful hints and tips for youth members and Cloverbuds, followed by information for adult Screened Volunteers and Prospective Screened Volunteers:

Youth 4-H Members & Cloverbuds

- As you complete the enrollment process, <u>PLEASE READ ALL</u> of the directions thoroughly. <u>DO NOT</u> make assumptions.
- Any 4-H member wishing to participate in the 4-H Club Day contest on February 17, must submit their online enrollment and health information no later than 11:59 p.m. on December 1. In order to exhibit at the county fair, the enrollment deadline for <u>returning 4-H members</u> is December 1, and for <u>new 4-H members</u>, the deadline is May 1. All 4-H members have the opportunity to add and drop projects by May 1.

• Tips:

- Each family should have received (or will receive) a brochure from their 4-H club Organizational Leader with directions on how to re-enroll or enroll in the 4HOnline system (https://v2.4honline.com)
- You will need to use either Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox as your web browser. If you are using a Mac, iPad, iPhone, Android device, etc., you will still need to use Chrome or Firefox instead of Safari, Microsoft Edge, etc.
- We strongly encourage a parent to enroll the 4-H member(s). This can be a joint effort with both the parent and youth. A parent will need to complete the health information online.
- Please make note of the email address and password you use (only one required per 4-H
 family). You may want to write it down and place it in a secure location. You will need this
 information for your child(ren) to update information in case you move, re-enroll next year, etc.
- Be sure to allow enough time when you begin the enrollment process. You DO NOT have to complete the enrollment all in one setting. It will take an average of 20 minutes for a family with one child to enroll and approximately 5-7 minutes for each additional child (times are approximate). Do not forget to hit the SUBMIT BUTTON to record the information in the 4HOnline system.
- Be sure to have the list of projects your child(ren) want to enroll in when you get ready to enroll them. A list of the current projects is available at http://www.centralkansas.k-state.edu/4-h/ under 4-H Information. Youth must enroll in at least one project. Do not forget to hit the SUBMIT BUTTON to record the addition of projects.
- CLOVERBUDS will need to enroll online as well. They should select a club and the "Cloverbud participant" as their project. If other projects are selected, the projects will be deleted before their enrollment is activated.

• <u>CONSENT APPROVAL</u>

- Please read ALL information within the "Consents" section carefully when enrolling. Your responses <u>cannot</u> be changed until you enroll for the next 4-H year (2024-2025).
- Publicity Release: Declining publicity release consent means your child's photo or name will NOT be displayed in any form of public print, online lists, or social media at the state, local, or club level within 4-H. Common examples of where names and/or photos are used typically include the name on their exhibits, results lists, press releases, event programs/schedules, etc.
- **Kansas 4-H Code of Conduct**: Parents, please read through the Kansas 4-H Code of Conduct carefully with your child(ren) so they understand exactly what is expected of a 4-H member.

• 4-H PROGRAMMING FEE

- o 4-H members, ages 7-18 are required to pay the enrollment fee. Cloverbuds do not have to pay the fee. There is no family cap.
- o Payment options include: debit/credit card; check; waiver. Members may apply for a waiver to pay the program fee when they enroll.
- o The Program Fee is NOT tax deductible since it is paying for specific individuals.
- o <u>Families will be responsible for paying the Kansas 4-H Programming Fee online during</u> enrollment. If your club has voted to pay the programming fee or any portion of it, you will need to pay it and be reimbursed. Be sure to check with your Organizational Leader for more details.
- No enrollment will be complete until the online enrollment, health information has been completed and accepted, and the \$15 fee has been paid.
- Because each club is different with the items the new potential members and Cloverbuds must meet, the
 Organizational Leaders will have to approve each new 4-H member's and Cloverbud's enrollment
 before we will accept the online enrollment.
- Do not forget to hit the **SUBMIT BUTTON** to record the information in the 4HOnline system anytime you make changes to a profile.
- If you do not have a computer or access to the internet, you may go to your local library to enroll your child(ren).
- If you have any questions, please contact either Extension Office.

<u>Screened Volunteers and Prospective Screened Volunteers</u>

- ONLY Screened Volunteers or Prospective Screened Volunteers) will need to enroll.
 - Returning Screened Volunteers will receive an email with the enrollment instructions. Please contact Kate at (785) 309-5850 or at <u>klittich@ksu.edu</u> if you have not received the email by October 13, 2023.
 - Prospective Screened Volunteers should receive an enrollment brochure from a club leader, or they may be obtained by contacting Kate at the number or email above. After providing enrollment information, Prospective Screened Volunteers should RSVP for Volunteer Orientation. Dates, times, and RSVP links can be found on the Central Kansas District 4-H website (https://www.centralkansas.k-state.edu/4-h) under "Upcoming Events & Online Registration."

• 4-H PROGRAMMING FEE

- o Screened Volunteers do not pay the program fee.
- Do not forget to hit the **SUBMIT BUTTON** to record the information in the 4HOnline system anytime you make changes to a profile.
- If you do not have a computer or access to the internet, you may go to your local library to access the 4HOnline system, or you may set up an appointment with Kate.
- If you have any questions, please contact either Extension Office.

Enrollment Deadline

Youth may join 4-H at any time during the 4-H year (October 1 through September 30); however, participating in some parts of the 4-H program may require enrollment or ownership deadlines.

Any 4-H member wishing to participate in the 4-H Club Day contest must be enrolled by December 1. In order to exhibit at the county fair, the enrollment deadline for returning 4-H members is December 1, and for new 4-H members, the deadline is May 1. All 4-H members have the opportunity to add and drop projects. This deadline is May 1. This will allow for mastery in the project(s) for which the 4-H member has enrolled.

Projects are listed in alphabetical order. If this is your first year in 4-H, we advise that you not enroll in more than one or two projects. After a year or more in 4-H, please consider the time and commitments carefully before you enroll in more than four projects.

Leadership Weekend – Kansas Youth Leadership Forum (KYLF) and Kansas Volunteer Leader Forum (KVF)

Lights, Camera, Action, Leadership! Kansas 4-H Leadership Weekend will be November 18-19 at Rock Springs 4-H Ranch and consists of the Kansas Youth Leadership Forum and the Kansas Volunteer Leader Forum.

KYLF is for youth ages 14-18 before January 1, 2024, and KVF is for all Kansas 4-H Volunteers. KYLF will feature leadership workshops, Youth Council Elections, and opportunities to learn and have fun. The Kansas 4-H Volunteer Leader Forum will feature workshops and information to help volunteers be more effective and learn from each other. This Forum for adults is organized by the Kansas Association of 4-H Volunteers.

This year's speaker will be Jason Wetzler. He has spoken to over 800,000 people in 45 states and three countries. Jason will have participants thinking, laughing and thankful they chose to attend.

Participants in both forums will register through the same system. Registration deadline is October 16, 2023, for both events. For more information about these events, go to https://www.kansas4-h.org/events-activities/index.html and look under Personal Development Events.

To be eligible for a scholarship through District 4-H Council, do not forget to complete the 4-H Council Scholarship Application (http://www.centralkansas.ksu.edu/4-h, under 4-H Member Forms and Documents) and turn in to the Extension Office before 5:00 p.m. on the registration deadline. The fee is \$200. If you receive a CKD 4-H Council Scholarship, it will cover\$75. There will be a \$25 cancellation fee that will be charged to any 4-H member who decides not to attend after registering. This is not a local fee, but a state fee. The 4-H Council Scholarship WILL NOT cover this cancellation fee.

KANSAS 4-H YOUTH LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

The Youth Council Application information link is now available on the KYLF webpage on the State 4-H Website. Any Kansas 4-H member between the ages of 14 and 18 before January 1, 2024, may apply as a Council Representative. This year's KYLF delegation will elect representatives from the four Extension program regions (NE, NW, SE, SW).

Youth Council members work to involve youth with K-State Research and Extension in promoting, developing, implementing, and evaluating Kansas Extension 4-H Youth Development programs in order to reflect the needs and interests of the youth in the state. Council members will also plan and conduct the Kansas Youth Leadership Forum, Citizenship in Action, Campference, 48 Hours of 4-H, and other events.

Please encourage those outstanding young leaders in your club to apply. **Applications are due online**October 2 before 11:59 p.m. CST, and one letter of reference must be uploaded on the registration site. Additionally, a 2 minute or less video introduction of the candidate will need to be submitted as well. The signature page should be postmarked by October 1. This year the elections will include the application process detailed above, and from those applications up to 12 young people per area will be invited to interview with a panel on Zoom. From those who interview, up to 6 candidates from each region will be selected to be in the election. If you have any questions about State Youth Council, please contact Jacob.





NATIONAL 4-H CONFERENCE

The National 4-H Conference is a working conference where youth and adults, at the invitation of the Secretary of Agriculture, assist in the development of recommendations to help guide 4-H Youth Development Programs nationally and in their communities. This event brings together youth, volunteer leaders, and state and county Extension staff

members from across the United States, the U.S. Territories, and the Canadian Provinces.

Delegates must be 15 to 18 years old before January 1, 2024, to apply. Up to six Kansas youth may be selected as delegates. Kansas 4-H members who have attended National 4-H Congress are eligible to apply for National 4-H Conference. The 2024 National 4-H Conference dates are April 19-24, 2024 in Arlington, Virginia. **Applications are due ONLINE by October 2, 11:59 p.m. and one letter of reference must be uploaded on the registration site.** For more information, please visit https://www.kansas4-h.org/events-activities/conferences-events/national-4-h-conference/index.html


From the state screening process, the top applicants will be invited to participate in an interview to select final delegates. Final selection of delegates will be made on the basis of the written application and interviews. Additional details regarding the interviews are not yet available. If selected as a National 4-H Conference delegate, there are additional responsibilities including being involved in the 4-H program through the State 4-H Youth Council and several other aspects of the Kansas 4-H program. The approximate share of the registration and transportation costs for delegates chosen to attend this conference is \$2,000. There are scholarship possibilities to help offset the cost of the delegate's portion through the District 4-H Council and the local 4-H club.

Introducing 4-H Project Partnership Teams

For over a century Kansas 4-H has been deeply rooted in volunteer and teen leader involvement. Throughout the years, we have had various groups and committees, most recently Kansas 4-H Action Teams, working across the 4-H project areas to deliver programmatic opportunities, make recommendations for project advancement, and the list goes on. It was time to re-evaluate the structure of these teams and how we move forward. These teams have played an integral role and will continue to do so, but with a new name and broader view. The Kansas State 4-H Team has reviewed the Kansas 4-H Action Team guidelines and rebranded this volunteer opportunity to be Kansas 4-H Project Partnership Teams. These teams will be able to provide opportunities for more 4-H project areas.

Can Projects Be Made at School?

Concerned about managing time and resources? You might consider combining 4-H and school projects. However, a few guidelines must be considered before combining, as a definite "yes" or "no" cannot be given across the board for all projects. To legitimize the option of projects serving dual roles answer the following questions:

- 1. Will you plan ahead of time to correlate the projects for better use of time and money?
- 2. Will the 4-H project you are enrolled in have similar suggested learning requirements as your school class?
- 3. Will the project be a part of the suggested learning and/or requirements in both the 4-H project and school projects?

If you can honestly answer YES to the above questions, then you can legitimize combining the two projects. HOWEVER...

- 1. If you wait to enroll in a 4-H project after the school project is completed and select a "project" that fits the completed school project...or
- 2. If you do no advanced planning but instead decide at the last minute to enter the completed school project at the fair because it's done. . .then. . . the project is not considered eligible as a 4-H project.

Take time now and pre-plan...it will save confusion in the end.

Note: There may be some specific rules for exhibiting at the county fair (i.e., if you enter an item you made at school, you may also have to enter an item you make at home). Please refer to the fair paper as soon as it is available to make sure you are able to meet the requirements for exhibiting at the fair.

Cloverbud Policies

To be eligible to participate, a child must have celebrated his or her 5th or 6th birthday before January 1 of the current 4-H year. When a child reaches the age of eligibility for traditional 4-H programs (age 7 or older before January 1 of the current 4-H year), the child and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) can decide whether to transition their child into 4-H club membership.



- Must complete 4HOnline enrollment.
- Cloverbud participants do not have to pay the \$15 Kansas 4-H Programming Fee.
- May exhibit items at the county fair under the Cloverbud Division may receive a Cloverbud ribbon, no premium.
- Membership is not counted toward 4-H years.
- Districtwide meetings will be held at the Salina Extension Office and will be adjusted as needed. Look for information in the 4-H Newsletter.
- Kansas 4-H Cloverbuds are not allowed to exhibit livestock. The 4-H Cloverbuds program is tailored to youth, with concerns for a child's physical, mental and emotional development. The physical difference in stature between a child and livestock can endanger a child. A child's maturity level and lack of understanding of animal behaviors also can increase the risk to the child. While a child may seem capable of handling livestock on the family farm and/or in familiar settings, managing livestock in a public setting can add stress and increase the risks for the child, the livestock and others who may be in the area. Allowing a young child to exhibit livestock in a public arena also increases the liability for all concerned.

Building Strong 4-H Clubs

The First Impression...clubs have only one chance to make a first impression! Let's hope it's a positive impression because if new members don't feel comfortable right away with the club they won't come back. Therefore, let's make a plan to have a welcoming environment where young people and adults feel accepted.

- Create a plan for welcoming new members...this may include assigning an adult volunteer or family to serve as the club's New Family Coordinator.
- The New Family Coordinator arrives early to meet the members and guests at the door. They might even have name tags available for members and a "4-H Greet Sheet" https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/4H1123.pdf for the guests.
- During the 4-H club meeting, the New Family Coordinator introduces the guests and assists them in understanding what is happening.
- After the meeting, the New Family Coordinator may follow-up with a postcard, phone call or email for thanking the guests for attending and answering questions.
- If guests become members, the New Family Coordinator can explain and answer questions about 4-H. The New Family Coordinator can become the new member's life-line to the 4-H club.

Parents' Committee

So now you have a Parents' Committee but you're not really sure what to do with it? First thing is learn to delegate. A rule of thumb—the Organizational Leader works with the 4-H members, the Parents' Committee works with the parents. But, it might take the Organizational Leader to get the Parents' Committee motivated and started down the right track! For more information, check out the resources for the Parents' Committee on the CKD website under "Organizational Leaders".

4-H Membership and Recruiting

Any time of the year is a good time to talk to people about 4-H, but the beginning of a new 4-H year is the perfect time to recruit new club members! 4-H membership is open to all youth between the ages of 7 and 18 (4-H age, before January 1, 2024. If a youth turns 7 after January 1, 2024, then they are considered a cloverbud until the next 4-H year.). 4-H does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability. A member may join anytime during the year. Any 4-H member who turns 19 before January 1, 2024, may not rejoin for the 2023-24 4-H year. If you have potential members who have visited your club, please let the Extension Office know the child's name, address, age, phone number and parents' name. Also remember that you can pick up visitor and new member packets at either Extension Office.
